2011 National Health Center Week Youth Poster Contest

Young people ages 9-18 are invited to participate in a youth poster contest to celebrate National Health Center Week (August 7-13).

Contest Rules:

Eligibility: Anyone ages 9-18 on August 1, 2011 living in Philadelphia or Chester, Delaware, or Montgomery Counties may participate.

Themes:

Posters should focus on the theme:

- **Community Health Centers: Meeting the Challenge of Health Care for All**

Or another theme based on the artist's knowledge of community health centers or the information provided on the contest fact sheet.

Materials and Requirements:

Posters must be original – you must create your own poster and not copy anyone else. Copyrighted characters (such as Superman) or copyrighted clip art will not be accepted. Artists may use any materials to make a 2-dimensional (flat) poster, such as oils, pastels, pen and ink, charcoal, crayon, chalk, markers, etc. Poster size should be no smaller than 8 ½" x 11" and no larger than 18" x 24". Posters should not be framed or laminated, but can be matted or mounted on a hard surface. A **completed entry/release form (see attached) must be attached to the back of all entries or they will not be included in the contest.**

Judging:

A panel of judges will rate each entry based on:

- How clear is the message? Does the poster show what the artist is trying to say?
- Does the poster relate to the subject of community health centers?
- How does the poster look? Is it creative and original? Does it show artistic ability?

Deadlines:

All entries **must be received by Friday, July 22 2011 at 5p.m.** Entries can be dropped off at any member health center. Please see attached list for locations.

Prizes/Awards Ceremony:

Entries will be judged in two age categories: 9-13 and 14-18. Prizes for each age category will be gift cards in the following amounts.

First Prize:	\$250
Second Prize:	\$150
Third Prize:	\$100

Depending how many entries are received, up to twenty-five finalists may be selected. **Prize winners' and finalists' work will be recognized at an awards ceremony on August 9th. Artists should plan to attend this event with their families, if possible.** Following National Health Center Week, finalists' and prize winners' work will be displayed in a special exhibit at City Hall.

Community Health Centers in the Philadelphia Area: A Fact Sheet

What are Community Health Centers?



Community Health Centers (CHCs) are places where you and your family can go to see a doctor or nurse and get the health care you need. Anyone can get health care at a CHC. It doesn't matter if you are young or old, if you have health insurance or not, if you speak English or not, or if you are healthy or sick.

Where are Community Health Centers?

Community Health Centers are in places all over the country where people might not have another place to go for care. Some are in cities and others are in rural areas (the country). There are over 1200 CHCs in the United States. Here in the Philadelphia area, there are 38 health centers in the city and the suburbs. You can find a map showing where they are, at www.healthfederation.org.



What services do health centers provide?

Health centers do primary care. This means anything that a doctor or nurse can do in an office, like check-ups, sick visits, shots, care for babies and pregnant women, and care for people with diseases like asthma and diabetes. Many health centers have dentists who can clean and check teeth and take care of cavities and other problems. Some health centers also have counselors who can talk to people who have problems in their lives. Many health centers also do health education – they teach people in their neighborhood how to live healthy lives.



Are health centers free?

No, but health centers charge based on how much money people earn so health centers are usually much less expensive than other kinds of doctor's offices. No one is ever turned away from a community health center because they can't pay. Health centers take insurance, like Medical Assistance and CHIP, and help people apply for these programs.



Do health centers have good doctors and nurses?

Yes! The people who work at health centers care a lot about their patients and are very good at their work. The doctors and nurses are highly trained and qualified. Studies have shown that the care at health centers can be even better than care in other kinds of doctor's offices.

Why are health centers important?

Without health centers, many people would have nowhere to turn when they needed to get care. This would mean that people would be sicker and some would even die. Health centers also give good jobs to people in their communities and help to keep neighborhoods safe and healthy places.



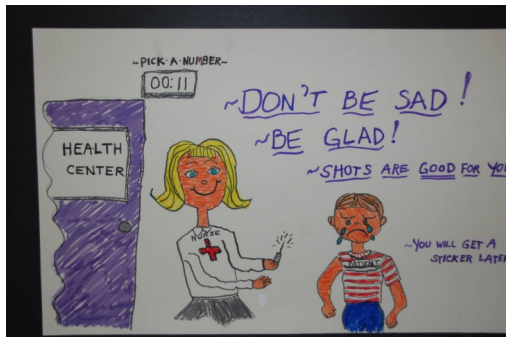

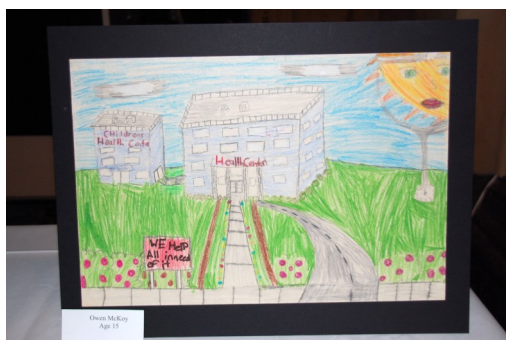
